This Study Tool uses the word boycott for the non-importation measures taken by the colonists; however, the word boycott was not coined until the 1880s. Webster's Encyclopedic Unabridged Dictionary states: "[after Charles C. Boycott., English estate manager in Ireland, against whom nonviolent coercive tactics were used in 1880." This, like many of the Study Tools, is **not** a sheet to be memorized, but a reference and a tool to bring everything together.

How to Use This Study Tool: An Example

Two examples show how to use the arrows to think about interconnections:

- The first use shows an ▶ under "Navigation Acts of the 1600s..." and then an ▲ under both the "Interests North" and "Interests South" because both are changed by this policy.
- The "ongoing struggles with whites..." and the "ongoing struggles with Indians..." columns each use ▶ and ◀ because each group has a consequence on the other.

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
