<b>Good Habit for Evidence in the World</b>	For your source of facts, use <b>only</b> sources your boss (or professor) accepts as reliable. — For example, unless your boss tells you "Google this for me and copy <i>anything</i> you like from the Internet," don't.
<b>What's Required for This Course</b>	<p>In this course, the <b>only</b> sources are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. The textbook chosen by the History Department</li><li>2. The sources provided within our Course Website.</li></ol> <p>Do not use:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Other Internet websites</li><li>• Another textbook</li><li>• Any other source—including other people or your own memory.</li></ul>
