¹ Examples: With vital industries, “cooling off” period. Allowed states to make themselves “right-to-work” states; done primarily by states in South and West who also encouraged movement of industry to those regions because of the law and lower wages. (Note: in the Great Depression and New Deal, organized labor traditionally voted Democratic.)

² **This 1965 act replaced the Immigration Act of 1924.** In 1924, the law set up national-origin quotas based on the nationalities in the United States in **1890**—predominantly from northern and western Europe. After 1890, the new immigration came from southern Europe—Italy and Poland.

³ Attorney General (Tom Clark): communists “everywhere” ver - Congress: HUAC (**R.M. Nixon**) in 1946 alleged Communists in Treasury, Agriculture; 1947, “Hollywood Ten”

⁶ AKA Service Readjustment Act of 1944 – 4 major programs: education (GED to college), home loans at low interest, medical treatment, unemployment insurance

⁷ Pent up demands from the Depression and World War II and--after initial shortages—greater availability of goods

⁸ Attorney General (Tom Clark): communists "everywhere" - Congress: HUAC in 1946 alleged Communists in Treasury, Agriculture; 1947, "Hollywood Ten"

⁹ Occupation ends in 1952 per Peace treaty with Japan signed by 49 nations.

¹⁰ Republicans' purpose: to reduce membership in unions. (Note: voting patterns of union members.) Allowed states to make themselves "right-to-work" states (Reminder: closed and open shop)

¹¹ Combination of Departments of War and Navy = new name of the Defense Department

¹² Increased taxes (a trend until Reagan) + increased military spending (a continuing trend) and spending on highways and airports especially by the 1950s by the federal government and states.

¹³ 1961, Soviets build wall between East, West Berlin. Future in 28 years: 1989-11, following opening of wall per Soviet decision, workers pulled down 1st section.

¹⁴ White prosperity, but lack of it by others in America. Rise of suburbs. Limited roles for women. Migration of African Americans and other minorities to the North.

¹⁵ US hydrogen bomb exploded 1952-11. Br: 1952-10, its first atomic weapon.

¹⁶ McCarthy (2nd Red Scare) not stopped until Eisenhower's term - Arthur Miller's *The Crucible* (1953), Eisenhower, the Senate, Edward R. Murrow, and television (the primary communication)
